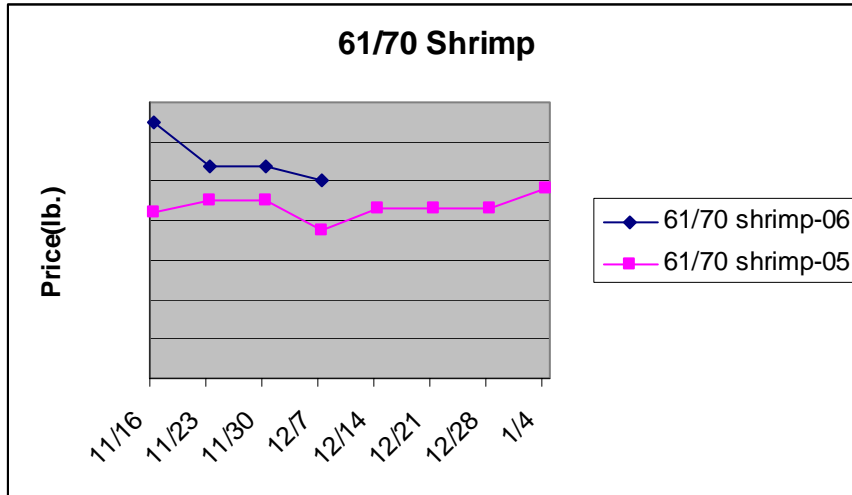


# Seafood Report

**Seafood**- Most of the shrimp markets, except for tiger, remain relatively soft due in part to strong US Gulf of Mexico production. Tiger shrimp inventories are restricted due to output shortfalls and good demand. Relatively elevated tiger shrimp prices are anticipated to persist into January. However, Japan is considering a ban on shrimp from Vietnam which could push more tiger product into the open market this winter.
